## **Guidelines and underpinning principles for the DRY-RUN from 18-22 May 2020**

### **Purpose of the DRY-RUN**

The DRY-RUN as explained in the communique sent by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (T&L), is scheduled to run from 18-22 May 2020 and has a specific purpose: to ascertain the ability of students to access the online course materials, interact with the academics and to attempt mock assessments (if possible). This exercise will culminate in a survey among both staff and students to ascertain preparedness for online teaching and learning (T&L), highlight areas of concern on accessing T&L course materials or interaction between academics and students, and fix system or related issues before the possible commencement of the official online programme on 1 June 2020.

### **Guidelines**

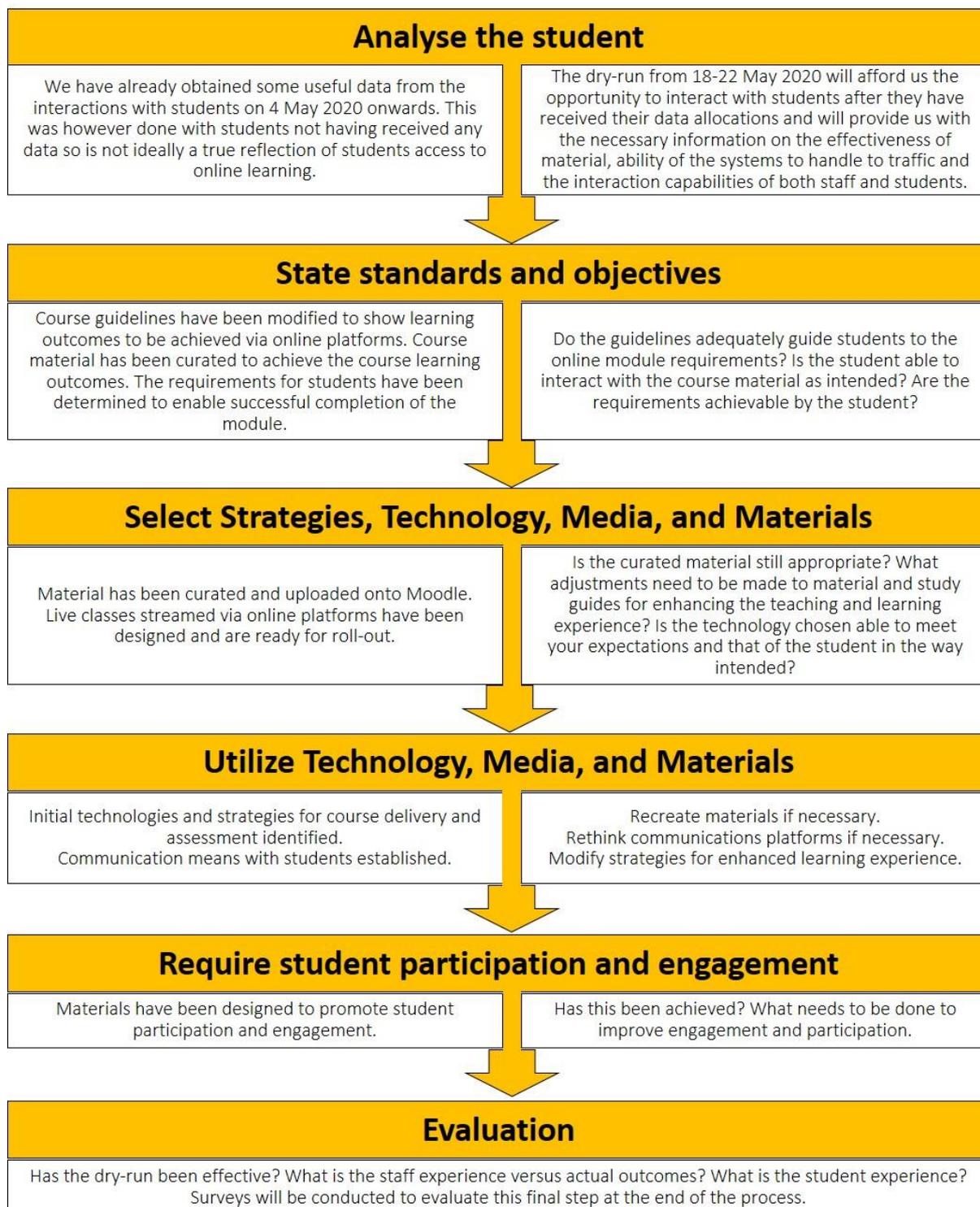
The ASSURE model by Smaldino, Lowther & Russell (2008)<sup>1</sup>, can be modified for the purposes of the online teaching and learning drive currently underway. The ASSURE model is originally designed to assist academics to effectively integrate technology into their courses to help 'assure' learning.

There are six parts to the entire exercise:

1. Analyze the students
2. State standards and objectives
3. Select strategies, technology, media and materials
4. Utilize technology, media and materials
5. Require student participation and engagement
6. Evaluation

In the figure below, the left-hand column represents what we currently have and the right-hand column provides guidance to what we expect from the DRY-RUN.

## Underpinning principles

- The assumption is that the standard lecture timetable will be used. Only lecturers teaching a particular section during this dry-run period will be involved at this point. Not all lecturers in every module will be part of the dry-run, however, the teaching materials for all aspects/sections of the module must be uploaded on Moodle.

- It is encouraged that this time is used to revise material covered previously and to introduce students to the online content for the course. Further, the time should be used to test the system and engage with students to ascertain their experiences and avenues for change.
- The DRY-RUN cannot be used to introduce material that is likely to be assessed in the formal course. Proper online teaching and learning will only commence when sanctioned by the university and most likely on 1 June 2020.
- Mock assessments will not count towards the final course assessment mark.
- Information on students who cannot access the material must be determined and necessary alternatives such as course packs of printed notes or pre-loaded USB drives should be made available. This will be coordinated from the Office of the Dean, Teaching and Learning through the ALTL in your school.
- We will assume only 4 weeks of the contact sessions have been completed and that online learning commencing 1 June 2020 will start at week 5 of the module plans. The DRY-RUN can be used to revise material covered in the previous 4 weeks before lock-down and introduce material that will start in week 5 of the academic programme per module but now moved online.
